#### **GOING ON THE OFFENSIVE**

- Defining Moments
- Turning the Tables
- In-Your-Face

We often emphasize the "gentle as a dove" side of Jesus: His gripping compassion, undeserving forgiveness, admirable meekness, authentic humility, unmerited mercy, never-ending grace, and His uncanny ability to understand everything about us and to touch our hearts exactly the way we need at the precise moment we need it.

But there's another side to Jesus, the "wise as a serpent" side. It's the in-your-face side that says it like it is—not that He had completely avoided confrontation before; He had His moments. He rebuked a few cities, addressed controversies over the Sabbath, referred to religious leaders as hypocrites and called their doctrine hypocrisy, and even rebuked them when their manmade traditions caused violations against God's laws. But now we are just four days from His crucifixion, and gentle Jesus has begun the final phase of His earthly ministry. Suddenly He does not seem so measured in

how He deals with the religious elite. In fact, He seems to have gone on the offensive.

Can you recall what happened after King David committed that atrocity with Bathsheba and then schemed to cover it up? He would do anything to hide his mistake, even murder. He could have taken any available woman he desired. Instead, he impregnated a married woman and had her poor husband killed to hide his sin. Immediately the Lord sends Nathan, David's prophet, to tell him a story. It's a parable but David thinks it's real. It's the type of story you tell someone to show him something about himself. Nathan describes a poor man who owned one little lamb, a lamb his entire family treated like one of the children. He also depicts a rich man who refused to feed a hungry traveler from his many flocks and herds, so he confiscated the poor man's only lamb. David was infuriated that anyone could do such a thing—a man like that should be put to death. Yes, a man who owns many and takes from a man who has just one deserves death, after he restores the poor man four-fold. David is being more than a bit obtuse here, don't you think? Nathan then fills in the blank; "David, you are that man!

Y'shua uses the same approach towards religious hypocrites, for whom He has grown increasingly intolerant. He tells a story of two sons, one who says he won't obey, but does, and one who says he will obey, but does not. Then He shares an elaborate parable

about a business owner and the operators who run his vineyard. The end of the story has the operators rejecting and killing THE SON of the owner, somehow believing they can usurp his inheritance and get away with it. They can't and they don't.

After the story the Pharisees, listening nearby, looked at one another and said, "I think He is talking about us!" You think? Earth to religious hypocrites—He is! Their reaction: No worries, we're not offended; it taught us a valuable lesson. NOT! Their true sentiment: Let's get this guy and take Him out, so we don't have to give Him what is rightfully His: our obedience, loyalty, thanksgiving, and praise! Hey, wait a second; that's exactly what the parable exposed! Brilliant, simply brilliant. Gentle as a dove AND wise as a serpent!

# Let's Set the Scene: Portion in a blurb

#### Introduction

Last week in Dilating the Pupils we began with yet another parable about the kingdom of heaven. Matthew 20 is written in a such a way that we might say it is structured with perfection—a teaching style at the highest level. Matthew is simply brilliant in his thought process. In other words, he witnessed these events and then he penned them in such a way that, not only do the events teach us deep lessons, but how he chose to string them together adds exponentially to that message. Of course, this is all by God's sovereign and divine design. Simply brilliant.

It is clear that our eyes MUST be opened to the economy of the kingdom of heaven. It does not operate as does the ways of the world. It's an upside down kingdom; the first will be last and the last will be first. We must give up our lives to live! It does not get more upside down than that. And the best way to come to this realization is to answer this question correctly when the King of the universe beckons, "What do you wish?" Or, said differently, "What do you want Me to do for you?"

Here's the bottom line. If you place yourself at the center of the answers to those questions, you still don't get it and you are no better off than a blind man groping in the darkness. This week Y'shua's turns up the heat. His lessons and parables become even more convicting, and it seems He is even more set on exposing religious leaders for their hypocrisy.

In chapter 21, He rides into town and accepts praise; turns over tables and chairs in the Temple; chases out the merchants and bankers; and accepts praise again—this time it really makes the religious elite angry. He curses a fig tree for not bearing fruit and it dies; and then He refuses to answer questions from the religious leaders, instead asking them a question they cannot answer, lest they back themselves into a corner no matter which answer they choose. They are left with no choice but to say, "We don't know!"

Then He tells a story about two sons, one who pretends to love his father and the other who really does, His message pointing to the leaders present as the pretenders. Gentle Jesus has given way to a more in-your-face Jesus.

Finally He likens the religious leaders of the day to business operators who would kill the son of the business owner just to take his inheritance. He warns them that they will never get away with rejecting and killing the son. The religious leaders get some wild idea that Y'shua is talking about them! And that's because He is!

#### Matthew 21

# **The Triumphal Entry**

- 1. Y'shua heads towards His ultimate destiny in Jerusalem.
- 2. He stopped in Bethphage, near the Mount of Olives.
- 3. He sends two disciples into the village to find a donkey and her young colt tied up.
- 4. Until them and bring them back to Me and if anyone asks, tell that the Lord needs them and they will understand.
- 5. This fulfills the prophecy of Zechariah 9:9.
- 6. The disciples do as instructed.
- 7. Then, Y'shua enters Jerusalem and is honored as He moves through the crowds.
- 8. "Who is this?" the crowds inquire. "This is Jesus."
- 9. They declared Him the Messiah (the Lamb of God).
- 10. This is what we classically understand as Palm Sunday.

## **Cleansing the Temple**

- 11. Y'shua drives out all the merchants and bankers taking advantage of the people and conducting commerce around the temple.
- 12. He flips their tables and chairs. What a scene! So much for gentle Jesus!

- (a) He refers to Isaiah and Jeremiah: "My house shall be called a house of prayer," (Is. 56:7) but you have made it a "den [hideout] of thieves." (Jer. 7:11)
- 13. At that point Y'shua heals the blind and the lame who came to Him in the temple.
- 14. The people repeat their praise... "Hosanna [**O**, Lord save us!] to the Son of David!"
- 15. But when the religious leaders see He is accepting praise, they are furious and rebuke Him!
- 16. Y'shua simply refers them to Psalm 8:2 "Yes. Have you never read, 'Out of the mouth of babes and nursing infants You have perfected praise'?"
- 17. Y'shua leaves for Bethany to lodge overnight.

## The Fig Tree

- 18. On His way back to Jerusalem in the morning, He finds a fig tree that should have fruit on it, but it doesn't.
- 19. He cursed the tree... "Let no fruit grow on you ever again." And the fig tree died instantly.
- 20. The disciples are in awe at how quickly it died.
- 21. He uses the moment to teach them about faith and not doubting.
- 22. You will be able to do things like this and even more, He promises. But you must have faith! You must pray and believe!

## **Questioning Authority**

- 23. Y'shua goes back to the Temple and His authority is questioned by the religious leaders.
- 24. In classic rabbinic style He answers them with a question.
- 25. If you answer My question I will answer yours, He says.
- 26. Y'shua's Question: Was the baptism of John legit (from God) or was he doing his own thing?
- 27. The religious leaders can't say John was a phony because the people watching the exchange considered John a true prophet and denying John's authenticity would stir up trouble.
- 28. At the same time they don't want to admit John was legit because it would also then legitimize Y'shua.
- 29. Y'shua has masterfully hemmed them in. The best they can do is remain neutral; "We do not know."
- 30. Y'shua says, if you can't answer Me, I won't answer you!

## The Parable of the Two Sons

- 31. Now He tells a story about two sons, one who pretends to love his father and the other who really does.
- 32. A man had two sons, and he gives both work assignments.
- 33. One says no, but later regrets his attitude, changes his mind, and does obey his father.
- 34. The other says yes initially, but ultimately ignores the work his father required.

- 35. Which will please the father; the first son who eventually came around and did what the father asked, or the second son who just gave his father lip service—looked like he'd obey, but didn't? The first, of course.
- 36. You see, you religious leaders are actually like the second son. You only say you will obey your father, but you really won't.
- 37. And the sinners you see all around you have a better chance of understanding the Kingdom of God than you ever will!
- 38. Your religious hypocrisy is why you rejected John the Baptist and yet all the common sinners believed him.
- 39. And even afterwards, when it was so obvious he was legit, you still would not relent and believe.

## **The Parable of the Wicked Vinedressers**

- 40. This parable is about a vineyard owner whose operation produces both grapes and wine.
- 41. He leased the setup to some operators and went far away.
- 42. When it was time to collect his portion, he sent his servants to collect and they, beat one, killed one, and stoned another.
- 43. He sends even more servants a second time and the same thing happens.
- 44. Then he sends his own son. Surely they will respect his son. But the operators reason that if they kill the son, they can keep his inheritance for themselves, so they do.

- 45. What do you think the father will do, go away quietly? No! He will wipe out those wicked men and he will find new operators who will act and respond the way they should.
- 46. Then Y'shua uses the Scriptures to connect the dots—he compares these wicked operators who rejected the son with the religious leaders listening to the parable!
  - (a) "Have you never read in the Scriptures: 'The stone which the builders rejected Has become the chief cornerstone. This was the Lord's doing, and it is marvelous in our eyes'?

## 47. The consequences:

- (a) The kingdom of God will be taken from you and given to a nation the will bear fruit.
- (b) Those guilty of coming against the chief cornerstone will be be broken.
- (c) Those whom the chief cornerstone must come against will be crushed into dust.
- (d) The religious leaders get some wild idea that Y'shua is talking about them! That's because He is!
- (e) Their thoughts on how to deal with it? Capture Him now and take Him down.
- (f) But their fear of those watching publicly prevent them.

#### **DEFINING MOMENTS**

# 1. Four Days and Counting

# A. Three Defining Moments

- (1) His Arrival
  - (a) He is the Lamb of God!
    - "The next day John saw Jesus coming toward him, and said, "Behold! The Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world!" John 1:29 NKJV
  - (b) He is the Son of God!
    - "And suddenly a voice came from heaven, saying,
       "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased."" Matthew 3:17 NKJV
  - (c) He is the Kingdom of God!
    - 1. "From that time Jesus began to preach and to say, "Repent, for **the kingdom of heaven is at hand.**""

      Matthew 4:17 NKJV (and Matthew 3:2)
- (2) The Turn Home (this is where we are in Matthew 21)
  - (a) He is the Messiah who comes in the Name of Yahweh!
    - "Then the multitudes who went before and those who followed cried out, saying: "Hosanna to the Son of David! 'Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!' Hosanna in the highest!"" Matthew 21:9
       NKJV

- (b) "Who is this?" This is Y'shua (Yahweh is Salvation)
  - 1. "And when He had come into Jerusalem, all the city was moved, saying, "Who is this?" So the multitudes said, "This is Jesus, the prophet from Nazareth of Galilee."" Matthew 21:10-11 NKJV
- (3) The Point of No Return (coming soon)
  - (a) In the Garden when He chose to stay...forever!
    - 1. "He went a little farther and fell on His face, and prayed, saying, "O My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from Me; nevertheless, **not as I will, but as You will.**"" Matthew 26:39 NKJV (again in Matthew 26:42)
  - (b) Why forever? In compliance with the Law of the Hebrew Servant!
    - 1. "If you buy a **Hebrew servant**, he shall serve six years; and in the seventh he shall go out free and pay nothing. If he comes in by himself, he shall go out by himself; if he comes in married, then his wife shall go out with him. If his master has given him a wife, and she has borne him sons or daughters, the wife and her children shall be her master's, and he shall go out by himself. But if the servant plainly says, 'I love my master, my wife, and my children; I will not go out

- free,' then his master shall bring him to the judges.

  He shall also bring him to the door, or to the doorpost, and his master shall pierce his ear with an awl; and he shall serve him forever." Exodus 21:2-6 NKIV
- a) Y'shua came to earth as a bondservant without a wife: "made Himself of no reputation, taking the form of a bondservant, and coming in the likeness of men." Philippians 2:7 NKJV
- b) He was betrothed a bride (that's you) by His Master, after He became a slave, so...
- c) ...to keep His bride, He had to choose to stay! Hence... "not My will, but Yours, be done."
- (c) Even when those close to Him attempted to stop it, He was steadfast in His decision!
  - 1. "But Jesus said to him, "Friend [Judas], why have you come?" Then they came and laid hands on Jesus and took Him. And suddenly, one of those who were with Jesus [John 18:10 says it was Peter] stretched out his hand and drew his sword, struck the servant of the high priest, and cut off his ear. But Jesus said to him, "Put your sword in its place, for all who take the sword will perish by the sword. Or do you think that

I cannot now pray to My Father, and He will provide Me with more than twelve legions of angels?"

Matthew 26:50-53 NKJV

- **B.** The Triumphal Entry (Defining Moment #2)
  - (1) A Defining Moment and Prophetic Treasure Trove
    - (a) Four days before the crucifixion...
      - 1. "Now when they drew near Jerusalem, and came to Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, then Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village opposite you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her. Loose them and bring them to Me. And if anyone says anything to you, you shall say, 'The Lord has need of them,' and immediately he will send them." All this was done that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by the prophet, saying: "Tell the daughter of Zion, 'Behold, your King is coming to you, Lowly, and sitting on a donkey, A colt, the foal of a donkey." " So the disciples went and did as Jesus commanded them. They brought the donkey and the colt, laid their clothes on them, and set Him on them. **And a very great multitude** spread their clothes on the road; others cut down branches from the trees and spread

them on the road. Then the multitudes who went before and those who followed cried out, saying: "Hosanna to the Son of David! 'Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!' Hosanna in the highest!" And when He had come into Jerusalem, all the city was moved, saying, "Who is this?" So the multitudes said, "This is Jesus, the prophet from Nazareth of Galilee."" Matthew 21:1-11 NKJV

- (2) Y'shua heads towards His ultimate destiny in Jerusalem
  - (a) He stops in Bethphage, near the Mount of Olives...
    - 1. Bethphage means "house of unripe figs," symbolic for God's judgment on the religious leadership for their failure to produce righteous fruit. As you will see shortly, He will curse a fruitless fig tree.
    - 2. The Mount of Olives sits to the East of Jerusalem (separated from the eastern wall of the Temple Mount by the Kidron Valley).
  - (b) He sends two disciples into the village to find a donkey and her young colt tied up.
  - (c) Until them and bring them back to Me, He instructs, and if anyone asks, tell that the Lord needs them and they will understand.

(d) This fulfills the prophecy of Zechariah 9:9..."Tell the daughter of Zion, 'Behold, your King is coming to you, Lowly, and sitting on a donkey, A colt, the foal of a donkey."

## (3) Prophetic Timeout!

- (a) When you go directly to the words of the prophet, he also includes Rejoice greatly; He is just and having salvation.
  - 1. "Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion! Shout, O daughter of Jerusalem! Behold, your King is coming to you; He is just and having salvation, Lowly and riding on a donkey, A colt, the foal of a donkey."

    Zechariah 9:9 NKJV
- (b) And if you continue in the words of the prophet just until the end of the same chapter, the prophetic pictures unfolds... what will be the ultimate outcome of this defining moment? (Note: this is a Rabbinic teaching style that you would do well to consider. When words of a prophecy or any Old Testament scriptures are invoked, GO TO THE SOURCE and read around the quoted area to glean the complete message. Students are expected to do such. You will become an excellent student of the Bible if you do so, and your

- understanding will explode and the Word of God will reprogram your brain and DNA!)
- 1. BEFORE: ""A mixed race shall settle in Ashdod, And I will cut off the pride of the Philistines. I will take away the blood from his mouth, And the abominations from between his teeth. But he who remains, even he shall be for our God, And shall be like a leader in Judah, And Ekron like a Jebusite. I will camp around My house Because of the army, Because of him who passes by and him who returns.
  No more shall an oppressor pass through them, For now I have seen with My eyes." Zechariah 9:6-8
- 2. AFTER: "I will cut off the chariot from Ephraim And the horse from Jerusalem; The battle bow shall be cut off. He shall speak peace to the nations; His dominion shall be 'from sea to sea, And from the River to the ends of the earth.' "As for you also, Because of the blood of your covenant, I will set your prisoners free from the waterless pit. Return to the stronghold, You prisoners of hope. Even today I declare That I will restore double to you. For I have bent Judah, My bow, Fitted the bow with Ephraim,

And raised up your sons, O Zion, **Against your sons**, **O** Greece, And made you like the sword of a mighty man." Then the Lord will be seen over them, And His arrow will go forth like lightning. The Lord God will blow the trumpet, And go with whirlwinds from the south. The Lord of hosts will defend them; They shall devour and subdue with slingstones. They shall drink and roar as if with wine; They shall be filled with blood like basins, Like the corners of the altar. **The** Lord their God will save them in that day, As the flock of His people. For they shall be like the jewels of a crown, Lifted like a banner over His land—For how great is its goodness And how great its beauty! Grain shall make the young men thrive, And new wine the young women." Zechariah 9:10-17 NKJV

- a) There is SO MUCH going on here but, minimally, you can see why those waiting on the Messiah figured Him to be a militant king who would destroy Israel's enemies and restore her to power.
- b) The secret here, as always, is that these prophecies are fulfilled in layers—First He comes as a suffering servant, then again as a reigning king.

- c) That is why Elijah prepares the way for His first coming and His second coming!
  - 1) "Jesus answered and said to them, "Indeed,
    Elijah is coming first and will restore all things.
    But I say to you that Elijah has come already,
    and they did not know him but did to him
    whatever they wished. Likewise the Son of Man
    is also about to suffer at their hands." Then the
    disciples understood that He spoke to them of
    John the Baptist." (Matthew 17:11-13)
- d) John came in the spirit of Elijah to turn hearts and prepare the way before Christ's first coming as the suffering servant.
  - 1) "He [John] will also go before Him in the spirit and power of Elijah, 'to turn the hearts of the fathers to the children,' and the disobedient to the wisdom of the just, to make ready a people prepared for the Lord."" (Luke 1:17)
- e) And Elijah will come again to turn hearts and prepare the way, before He comes at the end as a reigning king...
  - 1) "Behold, I will send you Elijah the prophet

    Before the coming of the great and dreadful

day of the Lord. And he will turn The hearts of the fathers to the children, And the hearts of the children to their fathers, Lest I come and strike the earth with a curse." (Malachi 4:5-6)

- (c) What other prophetic pieces can we draw from the source material?
  - 1. He will cut off the pride of the pagans currently in charge.
  - 2. Those who remain will be on God's side and will be leaders over His people.
  - 3. He will live among His people.
  - 4. The oppression and oppressors will be ousted forever.
  - 5. Aggression against His people will end!
  - 6. He will bring peace to the nations.
  - 7. His dominion shall be over the whole earth.
  - 8. All spiritual prisoners will be set free; their eyes will be opened.
  - Former prisoners who hoped for freedom will become leaders.
  - 10. He will restore double to those who were formerly oppressed.
  - 11. The oppression will move to the pagans.

- 12. The Lord will save His people, take His place as ruler, and will remain as their protector.
- 13. His people will be His reward and testimony!
- (4) The disciples do what they are instructed to do...
  - (a) Y'shua then enters Jerusalem and is honored as He moves through the crowds.
  - (b) "Who is this?" the crowds inquire. "This is Jesus."
  - (c) In an extraordinary prophetic moment, they declare
    Him the Messiah (the Lamb of God). "Hosanna [O, Lord
    save us! In both Aramaic and Hebrew expression —
    declaring He is our expected Messiah] to the Son of
    David! 'Blessed is He who comes in the name of the
    Lord!' Hosanna in the highest!"
  - (d) Drawing again from prophecy and using what you just learned about going to the source...Let us explore "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!"
    - 1. "The stone which the builders rejected Has become the chief cornerstone. This was the Lord's doing; It is marvelous in our eyes. This is the day the Lord has made; We will rejoice and be glad in it. {25} Save now, I pray, O Lord; O Lord, I pray, send now prosperity. {26} Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! We have blessed you from the house of

- the Lord." Psalms 118:22-26 NKJV (You should take your time to read all of Psalm 118.)
- a) Y'shua has come in the Name of Yahweh! (Y'shua means "Yahweh is Salvation")
- b) He is the \*chief cornerstone! [You will see the Prophetic details about the Chief Cornerstone in #(6) at the end of this section.]
- c) The cornerstone is set in place **first** so that all other stones can be laid in place **in perfect alignment** with it! That makes the whole building (Temple of the Holy Spirit) perfect!
- d) Yet, He is about to be rejected and crucified by the religious leaders and that is precisely His Father's plan!
- e) What day should we be rejoicing? The day He rode into town and the people declared to the world that He was the Messiah—the Lamb of God!
- (5) What day did He ride into Jerusalem?
  - (a) This day is what we classically understand as Palm Sunday.
    - We can be sure it was a Sunday because the Lamb for Passover must be selected \*four days before Passover. That year, at His crucifixion, He would

- become the ultimate Passover Lamb. And as you will see shortly, we can be 100% certain that Passover was a Wednesday evening that year.
- a) Note: Two days later, Y'shua guaranteed the whole world would know He was THE PASSOVER!

  "Now it came to pass, when Jesus had finished all these sayings, that He said to His disciples, "You know that after two days is the Passover, and the Son of Man will be delivered up to be crucified.""

  Matthew 26:1-2 NKJV
- 2. How do we know He rode into town four days before the crucifixion? Because this is when the Passover Lamb is selected.
  - "Speak to all the congregation of Israel, saying:

    'On the tenth of this month [four days before

    Passover] every man shall take for himself a lamb,
    according to the house of his father, a lamb for a
    household. And if the household is too small for
    the lamb, let him and his neighbor next to his
    house take it according to the number of the
    persons; according to each man's need you shall
    make your count for the lamb [Y'shua was the
    Lamb for EVERYONE]. Your lamb shall be without

blemish, a male of the first year. You may take it from the sheep or from the goats. Now you shall keep it until the fourteenth day of the same month [Passover begins as the sun sets on the 14th and it becomes the 15th]. Then the whole assembly of the congregation of Israel shall kill it at twilight." [That is why Y'shua was killed on the 14th and was in the grave before sunset—because He was the Passover Lamb that year.] Exodus 12:3-6 NKJV

- 3. How do we know He came into Jerusalem on a Sunday (the first day of the week, exactly four days before Passover when the lamb is selected)? In other words, how can we be certain that Sunday that year was four days before Passover, guaranteeing that Passover was on Wednesday (the fourth day of the week) that year?
- 4. It is actually quite simple.
  - a) He told us He would be in the grave three days and three nights. "An evil and adulterous generation seeks after a sign, and no sign will be given to it except the sign of the prophet Jonah [Jonah 1:17]. For as Jonah was three days and three nights in the belly of the great fish, so will the

- **Son of Man be** <u>three days and three nights</u> [72 hours] in the heart of the earth." Matthew 12:39-40 NKJV
- b) And the only time you can get three days and three nights between the Passover and the Feast of First Fruits (the Resurrection Feast) is when Passover is on a Wednesday. First Fruits is always the day after the weekly Sabbath that follows Passover (See Leviticus 23:9-11]. Do the Math! Wednesday late afternoon He is off the cross in in the Grave. Three days and three nights later is Saturday evening (He resurrects right before sunset, 72 hours later, at the same time He went in the grave, when at sundown it becomes the Feast of First Fruits.) He presents the first fruits offering to His Father—exactly how the High Priest had practiced it for over 1500 years! "But now Christ is risen from the dead, and has **become the firstfruits** of those who have fallen asleep." I Corinthians 15:20 NKJV
- 5. The Events of the Crucifixion Day (see Mark 15:25-37)
  - a) On the cross 9am, died at 3pm and then into the grave (oven).

- 1) New day begins at sunset, around 7pm in April in Jerusalem.
- 2) Passover is a moment "between the evenings"
- 3) See: <u>Passover Preparation 2023</u>
- 4) See: <u>Passover Service 2023</u>
- (6) \*Chief Cornerstone Goodies (See <u>In Him in You PART I</u>)
  - (a) The foundation of the Church is comprised of three foundation stones, one being the Chief Cornerstone, Christ, and the other two being the apostle and prophet.
    - 1. "Now, therefore, you are no longer strangers and foreigners, but fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God, having been built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ Himself being the chief cornerstone, in whom the whole building, being fitted together, grows into a holy temple in the Lord, in whom you also are being built together for a dwelling place of God in the Spirit." Ephesians 2:19-22 NKJV
      - a) The household of God has prophets and apostles as stones in the foundation with Christ as the chief cornerstone.
      - b) The Building that is built on that foundation is the church, the Temple of God.

- c) As you can see, there are three stones (offices) and that should clue you in to something prophetic—as each human, an individual temple of the Holy Spirit (I Corinthians 3:16-17; 6:19-20) is built on "three offices" (the Spirit, Soul and Body), even as is proper governance (King, Priest, Prophet & Executive, Legislative, Judicial).
  - 1) "Do you not know that you are the temple of God and that the Spirit of God dwells in you? If anyone defiles the temple of God, God will destroy him. For the temple of God is holy, which temple you are." I Corinthians 3:16-17 NKJV
  - 2) "Or do you not know that your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit who is in you, whom you have from God, and you are not your own? For you were bought at a price; therefore glorify God in your body and in your spirit, which are God's." I Corinthians 6:19-20 NKJV
- (b) Two Stones (Offices)
  - 1. **The Prophet:** corrects and directs based on the pure truth of Yahweh. He moves God's people, en masse, in the direction of God's plan for mankind—so they

are all going in the same direction. The corrections come when some want to split off and go their own way. The inactivity of this office in the Church today has given rise to over 40,000 Christian denominations (all going their own way). This is not to be confused with the gift of prophecy which is a pastoral gift. The pastoral ministries are those that minister to personal everyday needs. Giving someone a personal prophecy (if you are gifted to do such) is wonderful, but such does not make one a prophet.

2. The Apostle: acts as a type of super-pastor, or overseer of all pastoral ministries. "And He Himself gave some to be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, and some pastors and teachers, for the equipping of the saints for the work of ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ," (Ephesians 4:11-12) All but the prophet here are concerned with ministry of everyday life. The apostle is unique in that he has a pastoral gifting as a leader who also plants others in pastoral ministries—many times laying down tracks where none previously existed. And what is most unique is that the apostle can appreciate and fully integrate the prophetic (the message of the

- prophet and prophetic patterns) into pastoral ministry. In other words, he is neither threatened, offended by, nor dismissive of the prophetic ministry.
- (c) The Chief Cornerstone: Later in this very chapter, Y'shua rounds out what will take place, prophetically, throughout the four days after He enters the city. It is the people who declare...
  - 1. "Hosanna to the Son of David! 'Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!' Hosanna in the highest!"" (Matthew 21:9) and it those words from Psalms 118:26 that also brought us to Psalms 118:28..." "The stone which the builders rejected Has become the chief cornerstone." And Y'shua will build on this a bit later when He grabs that idea from Psalm 118 and declares that He is the Chief Cornerstone. "Jesus said to them, "Have you never read in the Scriptures: 'The stone which the builders rejected Has become the chief cornerstone. This was the Lord's doing, And it is marvelous in our eyes'?"
    - a) Yes, He is about to be rejected, and a little later when we see His claim in Matthew 21:42-46, the consequences for those who do will be very dire!

- (d) Peter, afterwards, would masterfully describe how these stones fit together (the apostle, prophet and Chief Cornerstone).
  - 1. "Coming to Him as to a living stone, rejected indeed by men, but chosen by God and precious, you also, as living stones, are being built up a spiritual house, a holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. Therefore it is also contained in the Scripture, "Behold, I lay in Zion **A chief cornerstone,** elect, precious, And he who believes on Him will by no means be put to shame." Therefore, to you who believe, He is precious; but to those who are disobedient, "The stone which the builders rejected Has become the chief cornerstone," and "A stone of stumbling And a rock of offense." They stumble, being disobedient to the word, to which they also were appointed." I Peter 2:4-8 NKIV
    - a) Peter furthers our prophetic knowledge by teaching us what it means to be offended by Him as the Chief Cornerstone, with his reference to Isaiah 8:14. Again, using our "good student" technique we search the source...

- 1) "For the Lord spoke thus to me with a strong hand, and instructed me that I should not walk in the way of this people, saying: "Do not say, 'A conspiracy,' Concerning all that this people **call a conspiracy,** Nor be afraid of their threats, nor be troubled. The Lord of hosts, Him you shall hallow; Let Him be your fear, And let Him be your dread. {14} He will be as a sanctuary, But a stone of stumbling and a rock of offense To both the houses of Israel, As a trap and a snare to the inhabitants of Jerusalem. {15} And many among them shall stumble; They shall fall and be broken, Be snared and taken." Bind up the testimony, Seal the law among my disciples." Isaiah 8:11-16 NKJV
- (e) Calling all Disciples: Those who come against Y'shua will say it's all conspiracy theory when they are accused of such. But they will fall.
  - Take this prophecy and store it for safe keeping. For when it happens you will look back and say, "Yahweh said this would happen!"
    - a) And as we see right at the end of this chapter... "And whoever falls on this stone will be broken;

but on whomever it falls, it will grind him to powder."" Matthew 21:44 NKJV

#### TURNING THE TABLES

## 2. Putting Your Opponents on Notice

# A. Cleansing the Temple

- (1) Get the sin out!
  - (a) "Do You hear what they are saying?"
    - 1. "Then Jesus went into the temple of God and drove out all those who bought and sold in the temple, and overturned the tables of the money changers and the seats of those who sold doves. And He said to them, "It is written, 'My house shall be called a house of prayer,' but you have made it a 'den of thieves.' " Then the blind and the lame came to Him in the temple, and He healed them. But when the chief priests and scribes saw the wonderful things that He did, and the children crying out in the temple and saying, "Hosanna to the Son of David!" they were indignant and said to Him, "Do You hear what these are saying?" And Jesus said to them, "Yes. Have you never read, 'Out of the mouth of babes and nursing infants You have perfected praise'?" Then He left

- them and went out of the city to Bethany, and He lodged there." Matthew 21:12-17 NKJV
- a) "Do You hear what they are saying?"
  - 1) Y'shua cleanses His Father's house of sin and then He performs miracles, and all the religious leaders can comprehend in their blindness is HOW WRONG it is that the people are proclaiming He is the awaited Messiah!
  - 2) HINT: getting the sin out is a preparation for Passover... *No leaven shall be found in your house for seven days (Exodus 12:9)* and you "cleanse your house" beforehand to be ready, just like we see here!
- (2) Y'shua drives out all the merchants and bankers who are taking advantage of the people, while conducting commerce around the temple.
  - (a) He flips their tables and chairs. What a scene! So much for gentle Jesus!
    - 1. He recalls Isaiah and Jeremiah: "My house shall be called a house of prayer," (Is. 56:7) but you have made it a "den [hideout] of thieves." (Jer. 7:11)
    - 2. Thieves? the people are being robbed both financially and spiritually!

- 3. Again, driving out these sinful activities is symbolic of Passover Preparation and Passover is just a few days away.
- (3) Another Prophetic Moment: We must get the leaven (sin) out of our households.
  - (a) The survivors of the 10th plague had to leave Egypt in a moment's notice, ...NO TIME for the bread to rise... symbolic as we "Prepare for Passover" to get the leaven (sin) out of our lives. ...Sin wants to rule you but you have the power to rule it! (Genesis 4:7)
    - 1. ...remove leaven from your houses. (Exodus 12:15)
    - 2. "Rise, go out. ... So the people took their dough before it was leavened... (Exodus 12:31, 34)
    - 3. ...nor shall leaven be seen among you ...This is done because of what the Lord did for me when I came up from Egypt.'" (Exodus 13:7-8)
  - (b) Y'shua on Leaven...Beware!
    - ... "Beware of the leaven of the Pharisees, which is hypocrisy." Luke 12:1NKJV
    - ..."Take heed and beware of the leaven of the Pharisees and the Sadducees." ...not the leaven of bread, but of the doctrine of the Pharisees and Sadducees." Matthew 16:6, 11-12 NKJV

- (c) Sin is lawless...DO NOT SIN!
  - 1. "Whoever commits sin also commits lawlessness, and sin is lawlessness. ... Whoever abides in Him does not sin. Whoever sins has neither seen Him nor known Him. ... Whoever has been born of God does not sin, for His seed remains in him; and he cannot sin, because he has been born of God." I John 3:4-6, 9 NKJV
  - 2. "Therefore do not let sin reign in your mortal body, ...do not present your members as instruments of unrighteousness to sin, ... For sin shall not have dominion over you, ... Shall we sin because we are not under law but under grace? Certainly not!"

    Romans 6:12-15 NKJV
- (d) Don't even entertain sin!
  - A little leaven leavens the whole lump." Galatians
     5:9 NKJV
  - 2. "... let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, ..." Hebrews 12:1 NKJV
- (4) At that point Y'shua heals the blind and the lame who came to Him in the Temple.
  - (a) The people repeat their praise... "Hosanna [O, Lord save us!] to the Son of David!"

- (b) But when the religious leaders see He is accepting praise, they are furious and rebuke Him!
- (c) And instead of shrinking back, Y'shua simply refers them to Psalm 8:2 "Yes. Have you never read, 'Out of the mouth of babes and nursing infants You have perfected praise'?"
- (d) And when we again explore the source, we see that what Y'shua is BOLDLY claiming is this! "I am God and it is the innocent children who can see it, and those who don's are His enemies!"
  - 1. "O Lord, our Lord, how magnificent is your reputation throughout the earth! You reveal your majesty in the heavens above! {2} From the mouths of children and nursing babies you have ordained praise on account of your adversaries, so that you might put an end to the vindictive enemy. When I look up at the heavens, which your fingers made, and see the moon and the stars, which you set in place, Of what importance is the human race, that you should notice them? Of what importance is mankind, that you should pay attention to them, and make them a little less than the heavenly beings? You grant mankind honor and majesty; you appoint them

everything under their authority, including all the sheep and cattle, as well as the wild animals, the birds in the sky, the fish in the sea and everything that moves through the currents of the seas. **O Lord, our Lord, how magnificent is your reputation throughout the earth!"** Psalms 8:1-9 NET

(e) Y'shua leaves for Bethany to lodge overnight.

# B. <u>Turning the Tables</u>

- (1) To reverse position relative to someone or something else, especially by turning a position of disadvantage into one of advantage.
- (2) I add these here to prepare your hearts! It is TIME FOR GOD'S PEOPLE to turn the tables on the evil that is going on in the world today!
- (3) We cannot combat this evil with political strategies and social change!
  - (a) "For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this age, against spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places." Ephesians 6:12 NKJV
- (4) Sample Narratives (without commentary)

- (a) David turns the table on Goliath: Just appreciate how many times David turns the table on Goliath and the Philistines—turning a position of disadvantage into one of advantage!
  - 1. "Now when the words which David spoke were heard, they reported them to Saul; and he sent for him. Then David said to Saul, "Let no man's heart fail because of him; your servant will go and fight with this Philistine." And Saul said to David, "You are **not able to go against this Philistine** to fight with him; for you are a youth, and he a man of war from his youth." But David said to Saul, "Your servant used to keep his father's sheep, and when a lion or a bear came and took a lamb out of the flock, I went out after it and struck it, and delivered the lamb from its mouth; and when it arose against me, I caught it by its beard, and struck and killed it. Your servant has killed both lion and bear; and this uncircumcised **Philistine will be like one of them**, seeing he has defied the armies of the living God." Moreover David said, "The Lord, who delivered me from the paw of the lion and from the paw of the bear, He will deliver me from the hand of this Philistine." And

Saul said to David, "Go, and the Lord be with you!" So Saul clothed David with his armor, and he put a bronze helmet on his head; he also clothed him with a coat of mail. David fastened his sword to his armor and tried to walk, for he had not tested them. And David said to Saul, "I cannot walk with these, for I have not tested them." So David took them off. Then he took his staff in his hand; and he chose for himself **five smooth stones** from the brook, and put them in a shepherd's bag, in a pouch which he had, and his sling was in his hand. And he drew near to the Philistine. So the Philistine came, and began drawing near to David, and the man who bore the shield went before him. And when the Philistine looked about and saw David, he disdained him; for he was only a youth, ruddy and good-looking. So the Philistine said to David, "Am I a dog, that you come to me with **sticks?"** And the Philistine cursed David by his gods. And the Philistine said to David, "Come to me, and I will give your flesh to the birds of the air and the beasts of the field!" Then David said to the Philistine, "You come to me with a sword, with a spear, and with a javelin. But I come to you in the

**name of the Lord of hosts,** the God of the armies of Israel, whom you have defied. This day the Lord will deliver you into my hand, and I will strike you and take your head from you. And this day I will give the carcasses of the camp of the Philistines to the birds of the air and the wild beasts of the earth, that all the earth may know that there is a God in Israel. Then all this assembly shall know that the Lord does not save with sword and spear; for the battle is the Lord's, and He will give you into our hands." So it was, when the Philistine arose and came and drew near to meet David, that **David hurried and ran toward** the army to meet the Philistine. Then David put his hand in his bag and took out a stone; and he slung it and struck the Philistine in his forehead, so that the stone sank into his forehead, and he fell on his face to the earth. So David prevailed over the Philistine with a sling and a stone, and struck the Philistine and killed him. But there was no sword in the hand of David. Therefore David ran and stood over the Philistine, took his sword and drew it out of its sheath and killed him, and cut off his head with it. And when the

- Philistines saw that their champion was dead, they fled." I Samuel 17:31-51 NKJV (Read all I Samuel 17)
- (b) Phinehas turns the tables on God's wrath and stops the plague, and is rewarded with a covenant of peace—turning a position of disadvantage into one of advantage! See: Zealous with Yahweh's Righteousness
  - 1. "Now when Phinehas the son of Eleazar, the son of Aaron the priest, saw it, he rose from among the congregation and took a javelin in his hand; and he went after the man of Israel into the tent and thrust both of them through, the man of Israel, and the woman through her body. So the plague was stopped among the children of Israel. And those who died in the plague were twenty-four thousand. Then the Lord spoke to Moses, saying: "Phinehas the son of Eleazar, the son of Aaron the priest, has **turned back My** wrath from the children of Israel, because he was zealous with My zeal among them, so that I did not consume the children of Israel in My zeal. Therefore say, 'Behold, I give to him My covenant of peace; and it shall be to him and his descendants after him a covenant of an everlasting priesthood, because he

was zealous for his God, and made atonement for the children of Israel.' "" Numbers 25:7-13 NKJV

#### **IN-YOUR-FACE**

# 3. Three Days and Counting

# A. The Fig Tree

- (1) Not So Gentle Jesus
  - (a) Y'shua heads back to Jerusalem three days before Passover!
    - 1. "Now in the morning, as He returned to the city, He was hungry. And seeing a fig tree by the road, He came to it and found nothing on it but leaves, and said to it, "Let no fruit grow on you ever again."

      Immediately the fig tree withered away. And when the disciples saw it, they marveled, saying, "How did the fig tree wither away so soon?" So Jesus answered and said to them, "Assuredly, I say to you, if you have faith and do not doubt, you will not only do what was done to the fig tree, but also if you say to this mountain, 'Be removed and be cast into the sea,' it will be done. And whatever things you ask in prayer, believing, you will receive."" Matthew 21:18-22 NKIV

- (2) On His way back to Jerusalem in the morning, He finds a fig tree that should have fruit on it, but it doesn't.
  - (a) He cursed the tree... "Let no fruit grow on you ever again." And the fig tree died instantly.
    - 1. Remember, Bethphage means "house of unripe figs" and stands as a symbol for God's judgment on the religious leadership for their failure to produce righteous fruit.
  - (b) The disciples are in awe at how quickly it died.
  - (c) He teaches them about faith and not doubting.
  - (d) You will be able to do things like this and even more, He promises. But you must have faith! You must pray and believe!
    - 1. And whatever things you ask in prayer, believing, you will receive."" Matthew 21:22
    - "Most assuredly, I say to you, he who believes in Me, the works that I do he will do also; and greater works than these he will do, because I go to My Father."
       John 14:12 NKJV
      - a) Ask in prayer and believe—and you will do even greater works. But... only if you have faith and do not doubt..." Matthew 21:21

- (3) In last week's sermon (<u>Dilating the Pupils</u>) we taught about some of the other parameters that make up proper asking...
  - (a) In His name (authority): "And whatever you ask in My name, that I will do, that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If you ask anything in My name, I will do it."

    John 14:13-14 NKJV
  - (b) In His will: "Now this is the confidence that we have in Him, that if we ask anything according to His will, He hears us. And if we know that He hears us, whatever we ask, we know that we have the petitions that we have asked of Him." I John 5:14-15 NKJV
  - (c) Without selfish motives: "Where do wars and fights come from among you? Do they not come from your desires for pleasure that war in your members? You lust and do not have. You murder and covet and cannot obtain. You fight and war. Yet you do not have because you do not ask. You ask and do not receive, because you ask amiss, that you may spend it on your pleasures." James 4:1-3 NKJV
  - (d) And we can reiterate Matthew 21:21 here with what <u>James say about doubting:</u> "But let him ask in faith, with no doubting, for he who doubts is like a wave of

the sea driven and tossed by the wind. For let not that man suppose that he will receive anything from the Lord; he is a double-minded man, unstable in all his ways." James 1:6-8 NKJV

# **B.** Questioning Authority

- (1) Wise as a serpent
  - (a) Answering questions with questions!
    - 1. "Now when He came into the temple, the chief priests and the elders of the people confronted Him as He was teaching, and said, "By what authority are You doing these things? And who gave You this authority?" But Jesus answered and said to them, "I also will ask you one thing, which if you tell Me, I likewise will tell you by what authority I do these things: The baptism of John—where was it from? From heaven or from men?" And they reasoned among themselves, saying, "If we say, 'From heaven,' He will say to us, 'Why then did you not believe him?' But if we say, 'From men,' we fear the multitude, for all count John as a prophet." So they answered Jesus and said, "We do not know." And He said to them, "Neither will I tell you by what authority I do these things." Matthew 21:23-27 NKJV

- (2) Y'shua goes back to the Temple and His authority is questioned by the religious leaders.
  - (a) In classic rabbinic style He answers with a question.
    - 1. If you answer My question I will answer yours.
    - 2. Was the baptism of John legit (from God) or was he doing his own thing?
    - 3. The religious leaders can't say John was a phony because the people watching the exchange considered John a true prophet and denying John's authenticity would stir up trouble.
    - 4. At the same time, they don't want to admit John was legit because it would also then legitimize Y'shua, because John baptized Y'shua, and claimed He was the Passover Lamb of God (John 1:29) and that the fullness of God was in Him! (see Matthew 3:1)
    - 5. If they legitimize John, they'd have to acknowledge the voice from heaven incident as well, and what it meant!... "And suddenly a voice came from heaven, saying, "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased." Matthew 3:17 NKJV
    - 6. Y'shua has masterful hemmed them in. The best they can do is remain neutral; "We do not know."
    - 7. "If you can't answer Me, I won't answer you!"

### C. The Parable of the Two Sons

- (1) Y'shua sets all gentleness aside...
  - (a) Tax collectors and harlots will enter the kingdom of God before you!
    - 1. ""But what do you think? A man had two sons, and he came to the first and said, 'Son, go, work today in my vineyard.' He answered and said, 'I will not,' but afterward he regretted it and went. Then he came to the second and said likewise. And he answered and said, 'I go, sir,' but he did not go. Which of the two did the will of his father?" They said to Him, "The first." Jesus said to them, "Assuredly, I say to you that tax collectors and harlots enter the kingdom of God before you. For John came to you in the way of righteousness, and you did not believe him; but tax collectors and harlots believed him; and when you saw it, you did not afterward relent and believe him."
- (2) Y'shua tells a story about two sons, one who pretends to love his father and the other who really does. Strap in for a less gentle Jesus and a more in-your-face Jesus.
  - (a) It seems that the nature of Y'shua's lessons and parables take a turn from here. His messages have already been

- convicting, and He has already not been shy about putting the religious leaders on notice and saying some very controversial things to them.
- (b) But from here on, until His death, burial and resurrection, He turns up the heat, becoming even more demonstrative against religious hypocrisy. In this chapter alone He has already ridden into town and accepted praise, turned over tables and chairs in the Temple, chased out the merchants and bankers, accepted praise again; killed a fig tree, and refused to answer questions of the religious leaders. Now, He tells a story...
- (3) A man had two sons, and he gives both work assignments
  - (a) One says no, but later regrets his attitude, changes his mind, and does obey his father.
  - (b) The other says yes initially, but ultimately ignores the work his father required.
  - (c) Which will please the father? The first son who eventually came around did what the father asked, or the second son who just gave his father lip service—looked like he'd obey—but did not!. The first, of course.
  - (d) You see, you religious leaders are actually like the second son. You only say you will obey your father, but you really won't.

- (e) And the sinners you see all around you (the ones actually acknowledging I am the Messiah) have a better chance of understanding the Kingdom of God than you ever will! Not so gentle!
- (f) Your religious hypocrisy is why you rejected John the Baptist, and yet all the common sinners believed him.
- (g) And even afterwards, when it was so obvious he was legit, you still would not relent and believe.

### D. The Parable of the Wicked Vinedressers

- (1) Yes, I'm talking to you!
  - (a) But when they saw the son...
    - 1. ""Hear another parable: There was a certain landowner who planted a vineyard and set a hedge around it, dug a winepress in it and built a tower. And he leased it to vinedressers and went into a far country. Now when vintage-time drew near, he sent his servants to the vinedressers, that they might receive its fruit. And the vinedressers took his servants, beat one, killed one, and stoned another. Again he sent other servants, more than the first, and they did likewise to them. Then last of all he sent his son to them, saying, 'They will respect my son.' But when the vinedressers saw the son, they

said among themselves, 'This is the heir. Come, let us **kill him and seize his inheritance.'** So they took him and cast him out of the vineyard and killed him. "Therefore, when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those vinedressers?" They said to Him, "He will destroy those wicked men miserably, and lease his vineyard to other vinedressers who will render to him the fruits in their seasons." Jesus said to them, "Have you never read in the Scriptures: 'The stone which the builders rejected Has become the **chief cornerstone.** This was the Lord's doing, And it is marvelous in our eyes'? "Therefore I say to you, the kingdom of God will be taken from you and given to a nation bearing the fruits of it. And whoever falls on this stone will be broken; but on whomever it falls, it will grind him to powder." Now when the chief priests and Pharisees heard His parables, **they** perceived that He was speaking of them. But when they sought to lay hands on Him, they feared the multitudes, because they took Him for a prophet." Matthew 21:33-46 NKJV

(2) This parable is about a vineyard owner whose operation produces both grapes and wine. It was set up with a

- watchtower which could be used during harvest season to look out over the harvesters (for their protection).
- (a) The owner leased the setup to some tenant operators and went far away.
- (b) When it was time to gather his portion, he sent his servants to collect and they, beat one, killed one, and stoned another.
- (c) He sends even more servants a second time and the same happens.
- (d) Then he sends his own son. Surely they will respect his son.
- (e) But the tenants reason that if they kill the son, they can keep his inheritance for themselves, so they do.
- (f) What do you think the father will do, go away quietly?

  No! He will wipe out those wicked men and he will find new tenants who will act and respond the way they should.
- (g) Then Y'shua uses the Scriptures to connect the dots—He compares these wicked operators who rejected the son with the religious leaders listening to the parable!
  - "Have you never read in the Scriptures: 'The stone
    which the builders rejected Has become the chief
    cornerstone. This was the Lord's doing, and it is

- marvelous in our eyes'? (Referring to Psalms 118:22-23)
- 2. Please recall all the details about the Chief Cornerstone in section one above. We will add some additional details below about the consequences for rejecting the Y'shua as the Chief Cornerstone.
- 3. It's like when Nathan decided to tell David a story and the story was all about David himself. You know that technique—your sitting there listening and feeling—"I think this about me!" Yes, this is about you!
- 4. See the Parable in II Samuel 12:1-4, and vv. 4-13 for David's reaction, and vv. 14-25 for the consequences.
- (h) Nathan's story to David has a similar tone as Y'shua's story to the Religious leaders. (Excerpt from our intro.)
  - 1. King David committed adultery with Bathsheba and then schemed to cover it up? He would do anything to hide his mistake, even murder. He could have taken any available woman he desired to be his wife. But instead, he impregnated a married woman and had her poor husband killed to hide his sin.
  - 2. Immediately the Lord sends Nathan, David's prophet, to tell him a story. It's a parable but David thinks it's

- real. It's the type of story you tell someone to show him something about himself. Nathan describes a poor man who owned one little lamb, a lamb his entire family treated like one of the children. He also depicts a rich man who refused to feed a hungry traveler from his many flocks and herds, so he confiscated the poor man's only lamb.
- 3. David was infuriated that anyone could do such a thing—a man like that should be put to death. Yes, a man who owns so much and takes from a man who has just one possession deserves death, after he restores the poor man four-fold. David is being more than a bit obtuse here, don't you think? Nathan then fills in the blank; "David, you are that man!
- (i) The consequences for David:
  - 1. The sword shall never depart from your house.
  - 2. Adversity and disaster will rise from within your own household.
  - 3. God will take your wives before your eyes and give them to your neighbor (companions).
  - 4. Your neighbor shall have sexual relations with your wives right out in the open for all to see.

- 5. What you have done has given reason for the enemies of the Lord to blaspheme Him, therefore the child shall surely die.
- (j) The consequences for the Religious Leaders who reject the Chief Cornerstone (Jesus):
  - 1. The kingdom of God will be taken from you and given to a nation the will bear fruit.
  - 2. Those guilty of coming against the chief cornerstone will be be broken.
  - 3. Those whom the chief cornerstone must come against will be crushed into dust.
  - 4. Then the religious leaders get some wild idea that Y'shua is talking about them! That's because He is!
  - 5. Their thoughts on how to deal with it? Capture Him now and take Him down. But their fear of those watching publicly prevent them.
    - a) That is why later they make a secret plan with Judas Iscariot deliver Him over quietly (See Matthew 26:14-16)

### (k) Your turn!

 "I am sending you out like sheep surrounded by wolves, so be wise as serpents and innocent as doves." Matthew 10:16 NET

- 2. "The wicked person flees when there is no one pursuing, but the righteous person is as confident [BOLD] as a lion. When a country is rebellious it has many princes, but by someone who is discerning and knowledgeable [wise, intelligent] order is maintained." Proverbs 28:1-2 NET
  - a) We are living in times in which the entire world has gone sideways. Evil is being offered as good and lies are rampant, told by men with absolutely no conscience or conviction, even when the liars know those listening know they are lying.
  - b) It's the most blatant disregard for truth and decency in history. Sure there have been monsters who pretended to be humans in the past; but they lied with the intent that those they lied to believed them.
  - c) What type of world do we live in when the monsters who pretend to be human know that everyone knows they are lying, and yet they still lie with a conviction and insistence supported by an almost robot-like disregard.
- 3. "Woe to those who call evil good, and good evil; Who put darkness for light, and light for darkness;

Who put bitter for sweet, and sweet for bitter! **Woe to** those who are wise in their own eyes, And prudent in their own sight! - a) Your roaring MUST BE like a roaring lion!
- b) You MUST lay hold of your prey!
- c) No one... will save FROM YOU the one...!
  - 1. who calls evil good, and good evil...
  - 2. who is wise in his own eyes...
  - 3. who justifies the wicked for a bribe
  - 4. who takes away justice from the righteous man!
- d) In that day YOU WILL roar against them like the roaring of the sea.
- e) Get ready to ROAR!

**Summary: DEFINING MOMENTS** 

- 1. Four Days and Counting
  - A. <u>Three Defining Moments</u>

- (1) His Arrival
  - (a) He is the Lamb of God!
  - (b) He is the Son of God!
  - (c) He is the Kingdom of God!
- (2) The Turn Home (this is where we are in Matthew 21)
  - (a) He is the Messiah who comes in the Name of Yahweh!
  - (b) "Who is this?" This is Y'shua (Yahweh is Salvation)
- (3) The Point of No Return (coming soon)
  - (a) In the Garden when He chose to stay...forever!
  - (b) Why forever? In compliance with the Law of the Hebrew Servant!
    - He was betrothed a bride (that's you) by His Master, after He became a slave, so...
    - 2. ...to keep His bride, He had to choose to stay! Hence... "not My will, but Yours, be done."
  - (c) Even when those close to Him attempted to stop it, He was steadfast in His decision!
- **B.** The Triumphal Entry (Defining Moment #2)
  - (1) A Defining Moment and Prophetic Treasure Trove
    - (a) Four days before the crucifixion...
  - (2) Y'shua heads towards His ultimate destiny in Jerusalem
    - (a) He stops in Bethphage, near the Mount of Olives...

- 1. Bethphage means "house of unripe figs," symbolic for God's judgment on the religious leadership for their failure to produce righteous fruit. As you will see shortly, He will curse a fruitless fig tree.
- 2. The Mount of Olives sits to the East of Jerusalem (separated from the eastern wall of the Temple Mount by the Kidron Valley).
- (b) He sends two disciples into the village to find a donkey and her young colt tied up.
- (c) Until them and bring them back to Me, He instructs, and if anyone asks, tell that the Lord needs them and they will understand.
- (d) This fulfills the prophecy of Zechariah 9:9
- (3) Prophetic Timeout!
  - (a) When you go directly to the words of the prophet, he also includes Rejoice greatly; He is just and having salvation.
  - (b) And if you continue in the words of the prophet just until the end of the same chapter, the prophetic pictures unfolds... what will be the ultimate outcome of this defining moment? (Note: this is a Rabbinic teaching style that you would do well to consider. When words of a prophecy or any Old Testament scriptures are

invoked, GO TO THE SOURCE and read around the quoted area to glean the complete message. Students are expected to do such. You will become an excellent student of the Bible if you do so, and your understanding will explode and the Word of God will reprogram your brain and DNA!)

- There is SO MUCH going on here but, minimally, you can see why those waiting on the Messiah figured Him to be a militant king who would destroy Israel's enemies and restore her to power.
- 2. The secret here, as always, is that these prophecies are fulfilled in layers—First He comes as a suffering servant, then again as a reigning king.
- 3. That is why Elijah prepares the way for His first coming and His second coming!
- 4. John came in the spirit of Elijah to turn hearts and prepare the way before Christ's first coming as the suffering servant.
- 5. And Elijah will come again to turn hearts and prepare the way, before He comes at the end as a reigning king...
- (c) What other prophetic pieces can we draw from the source material?

- 1. He will cut off the pride of the pagans currently in charge.
- 2. Those who remain will be on God's side and will be leaders over His people.
- 3. He will live among His people.
- 4. The oppression and oppressors will be ousted forever.
- 5. Aggression against His people will end!
- 6. He will bring peace to the nations.
- 7. His dominion shall be over the whole earth.
- 8. All spiritual prisoners will be set free; their eyes will be opened.
- 9. Former prisoners who hoped for freedom will become leaders.
- 10. He will restore double to those who were formerly oppressed.
- 11. The oppression will move to the pagans.
- 12. The Lord will save His people, take His place as ruler, and will remain as their protector.
- 13. His people will be His reward and testimony!
- (4) The disciples do what they are instructed to do...
  - (a) Y'shua then enters Jerusalem and is honored as He moves through the crowds.
  - (b) "Who is this?" the crowds inquire. "This is Jesus."

- (c) In an extraordinary prophetic moment, they declare
  Him the Messiah (the Lamb of God). "Hosanna [O, Lord save us! In both Aramaic and Hebrew expression —
  declaring He is our expected Messiah]...
- (d) Drawing again from prophecy and using what you just learned about going to the source...Let us explore "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!"
  - 1. Y'shua has come in the Name of Yahweh! (Y'shua means "Yahweh is Salvation")
  - 2. He is the \*chief cornerstone! [You will see the Prophetic details about the Chief Cornerstone in #(6) at the end of this section.]
  - 3. The cornerstone is set in place **first** so that all other stones can be laid in place **in perfect alignment** with it! That makes the whole building (Temple of the Holy Spirit) perfect!
  - 4. Yet, He is about to be rejected and crucified by the religious leaders and that is precisely His Father's plan!
  - 5. What day should we be rejoicing? The day He rode into town and the people declared to the world that He was the Messiah—the Lamb of God!
- (5) What day did He ride into Jerusalem?

- (a) This day is what we classically understand as Palm Sunday.
  - 1. We can be sure it was a Sunday because the Lamb for Passover must be selected \*four days before Passover. That year, at His crucifixion, He would become the ultimate Passover Lamb. And as you will see shortly, we can be 100% certain that Passover was a Wednesday evening that year.
  - 2. How do we know He rode into town four days before the crucifixion? Because this is when the Passover Lamb is selected.
    - a) On the tenth of this month, four days beforePassover, every man shall take for himself a lamb.
    - b) Y'shua was the Lamb for EVERYONE. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a male of the first year.
    - c) Keep it until the fourteenth day of the same month. Passover begins as the sun sets on the 14th and it becomes the 15th.
    - d) Kill it at twilight." That is why Y'shua was killed on the 14th and was in the grave before sunset—because He was the Passover Lamb that year.
  - 3. How do we know He came into Jerusalem on a Sunday (the first day of the week, exactly four days

before Passover when the lamb is selected)? In other words, how can we be certain that Sunday that year was four days before Passover, guaranteeing that Passover was on Wednesday (the fourth day of the week) that year?

- 4. It is actually quite simple.
  - a) He told us He would be in the grave three days and three nights.
  - h) And the only time you can get three days and three nights between the Passover and the Feast of First Fruits (the Resurrection Feast) is when Passover is on a Wednesday. First Fruits is always the day after the weekly Sabbath that follows Passover (See Leviticus 23:9-11]. Do the Math! Wednesday late afternoon He is off the cross in in the Grave. Three days and three nights later is Saturday evening (He resurrects right before sunset, 72 hours later, at the same time He went in the grave, when at sundown it becomes the Feast of First Fruits.) He presents the first fruits offering to His Father—exactly how the High Priest had practiced it for over 1500 years!
- 5. The Events of the Crucifixion Day (see Mark 15:25-37)

- a) On the cross 9am, died at 3pm and then into the grave (oven).
  - 1) New day begins at sunset, around 7pm in April in Jerusalem.
  - 2) Passover is a moment "between the evenings"
  - 3) Y'shua was the Passover Lamb that year. Two days after His arrival in Jerusalem, Y'shua guaranteed His disciples would understand this, as we are His disciples too.

### (6) \*Chief Cornerstone Goodies

- (a) The foundation of the Church is comprised of three foundation stones, one being the Chief Cornerstone, Christ, and the other two being the apostle and prophet.
  - 1. The household of God has prophets and apostles as stones in the foundation with Christ as the chief cornerstone.
  - 2. The Building that is built on that foundation is the church, the Temple of God.
  - 3. As you can see, there are three stones (offices) and that should clue you in to something prophetic—as each human, an individual temple of the Holy Spirit (I Corinthians 3:16-17; 6:19-20) is built on "three offices" (the Spirit, Soul and Body), even as is proper

governance (King, Priest, Prophet & Executive, Legislative, Judicial).

- (b) Two Stones (Offices)
  - 1. The Prophet: corrects and directs based on the pure truth of Yahweh. He moves God's people, en masse, in the direction of God's plan for mankind—so they are all going in the same direction. The corrections come when some want to split off and go their own way. The inactivity of this office in the Church today has given rise to over 40,000 Christian denominations (all going their own way). This is not to be confused with the gift of prophecy which is a pastoral gift. The pastoral ministries are those that minister to personal everyday needs. Giving someone a personal prophecy (if you are gifted to do such) is wonderful, but such does not make one a prophet.
  - 2. **The Apostle:** acts as a type of super-pastor, or overseer of all pastoral ministries. "And He Himself gave some to be apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors and teachers..." All but the prophet here are concerned with ministry of everyday life. The apostle is unique in that he has a pastoral gifting as a leader who also plants others in pastoral ministries—many

times laying down tracks where none previously existed. And what is most unique is that the apostle can appreciate and fully integrate the prophetic (the message of the prophet and prophetic patterns) into pastoral ministry. In other words, he is neither threatened, offended by, nor dismissive of the prophetic ministry.

- (c) The Chief Cornerstone: Later in this very chapter, Y'shua rounds out what will take place, prophetically, throughout the four days after He enters the city. It is the people who declare...
  - 1. Yes, He is about to be rejected, and a little later when we see His claim in Matthew 21:42-46, the consequences for those who do will be very dire!
- (d) Peter, afterwards, would masterfully describe how these stones fit together (the apostle, prophet and Chief Cornerstone).
  - 1. Peter furthers our prophetic knowledge by teaching us what it means to be offended by Him as the Chief Cornerstone, with his reference to Isaiah 8:14. Again, using our "good student" technique we search the source...

- (e) Calling all Disciples: Those who come against Y'shua will say it's all conspiracy theory when they are accused of such. But they will fall.
  - Take this prophecy and store it for safe keeping. For when it happens you will look back and say, "Yahweh said this would happen!"

# 2. Putting Your Opponents on Notice

# A. <u>Cleansing the Temple</u>

- (1) Get the sin out!
  - (a) "Do You hear what they are saying?"
    - 1. Do You hear what they are saying?"
      - a) Y'shua cleanses His Father's house of sin and then He performs miracles, and all the religious leaders can comprehend in their blindness is HOW WRONG it is that the people are proclaiming He is the awaited Messiah!
      - b) HINT: getting the sin out is a preparation for Passover... *No leaven shall be found in your house for seven days (Exodus 12:9)* and you "cleanse your house" beforehand to be ready, just like we see here!

- (2) Y'shua drives out all the merchants and bankers who are taking advantage of the people, while conducting commerce around the temple.
  - (a) He flips their tables and chairs. What a scene! So much for gentle Jesus!
    - 1. He recalls Isaiah and Jeremiah: "My house shall be called a house of prayer," (Is. 56:7) but you have made it a "den [hideout] of thieves." (Jer. 7:11)
    - 2. Thieves? the people are being robbed both financially and spiritually!
    - 3. Again, driving out these sinful activities is symbolic of Passover Preparation and Passover is just a few days away.
- (3) Another Prophetic Moment: We must get the leaven (sin) out of our households.
  - (a) The survivors of the 10th plague had to leave Egypt in a moment's notice, ...NO TIME for the bread to rise... symbolic as we "Prepare for Passover" to get the leaven (sin) out of our lives. ...Sin wants to rule you but you have the power to rule it! (Genesis 4:7)
    - 1. ...remove leaven from your houses. (Exodus 12:15)
    - 2. "Rise, go out. ...So the people took their dough before it was leavened... (Exodus 12:31, 34)

- 3. ...nor shall leaven be seen among you ...This is done because of what the Lord did for me when I came up from Egypt.'" (Exodus 13:7-8)
- (b) Y'shua on Leaven...Beware!
- (c) Sin is lawless...DO NOT SIN!
- (d) Don't even entertain sin!
- (4) At that point Y'shua heals the blind and the lame who came to Him in the Temple.
  - (a) The people repeat their praise... "Hosanna [O, Lord save us!] to the Son of David!"
  - (b) But when the religious leaders see He is accepting praise, they are furious and rebuke Him!
  - (c) And instead of shrinking back, Y'shua simply refers them to Psalm 8:2
  - (d) And when we again explore the source, we see that what Y'shua is BOLDLY claiming is this! "I am God and it is the innocent children who can see it, and those who don's are His enemies!"
  - (e) Y'shua leaves for Bethany to lodge overnight.

### B. <u>Turning the Tables</u>

(1) To reverse position relative to someone or something else, especially by turning a position of disadvantage into one of advantage.

- (2) I add these here to prepare your hearts! It is TIME FOR GOD'S PEOPLE to turn the tables on the evil that is going on in the world today! We cannot combat this evil with political strategies and social change!
- (3) Sample Narratives (without commentary)
  - (a) David turns the table on Goliath: Just appreciate how many times David turns the table on Goliath and the Philistines—turning a position of disadvantage into one of advantage!
  - (b) Phinehas turns the tables on God's wrath and stops the plague, and is rewarded with a covenant of peace turning a position of disadvantage into one of advantage!

### 3. Three Days and Counting

### A. The Fig Tree

- (1) Not So Gentle Jesus
  - (a) Y'shua heads back to Jerusalem three days before Passover!
- (2) On His way back to Jerusalem in the morning, He finds a fig tree that should have fruit on it, but it doesn't.

- (a) He cursed the tree... "Let no fruit grow on you ever again." And the fig tree died instantly.
  - 1. Remember, Bethphage means "house of unripe figs" and stands as a symbol for God's judgment on the religious leadership for their failure to produce righteous fruit.
- (b) The disciples are in awe at how quickly it died.
- (c) He teaches them about faith and not doubting.
- (d) You will be able to do things like this and even more, He promises. But you must have faith! You must pray and believe!
  - Ask in prayer and believe—and you will do even greater works. But... only if you have faith and do not doubt..." Matthew 21:21
- (3) In last week's sermon (<u>Dilating the Pupils</u>) we taught about some of the other parameters that make up proper asking...
  - (a) In His name (authority):
  - (b) In His will:
  - (c) Without selfish motives:
  - (d) And we can reiterate Matthew 21:21 here with what James say about doubting:

### **B.** Questioning Authority

- (1) Wise as a serpent
  - (a) Answering questions with questions!
- (2) Y'shua goes back to the Temple and His authority is questioned by the religious leaders.
  - (a) In classic rabbinic style He answers with a question.
    - 1. If you answer My question I will answer yours.
    - 2. Was the baptism of John legit (from God) or was he doing his own thing?
    - 3. The religious leaders can't say John was a phony because the people watching the exchange considered John a true prophet and denying John's authenticity would stir up trouble.
    - 4. At the same time, they don't want to admit John was legit because it would also then legitimize Y'shua, because John baptized Y'shua, and claimed He was the Passover Lamb of God (John 1:29) and that the fullness of God was in Him! (see Matthew 3:1)
    - 5. If they legitimize John, they'd have to acknowledge the voice from heaven incident as well, and what it meant!
    - 6. Y'shua has masterful hemmed them in. The best they can do is remain neutral; "We do not know."
    - 7. "If you can't answer Me, I won't answer you!"

### C. The Parable of the Two Sons

- (1) Y'shua sets all gentleness aside...
  - (a) Tax collectors and harlots will enter the kingdom of God before you!
- (2) Y'shua tells a story about two sons, one who pretends to love his father and the other who really does. Strap in for a less gentle Jesus and a more in-your-face Jesus.
  - (a) It seems that the nature of Y'shua's lessons and parables take a turn from here. His messages have already been convicting, and He has already not been shy about putting the religious leaders on notice and saying some very controversial things to them.
  - (b) But from here on, until His death, burial and resurrection, He turns up the heat, becoming even more demonstrative against religious hypocrisy. In this chapter alone He has already ridden into town and accepted praise, turned over tables and chairs in the Temple, chased out the merchants and bankers, accepted praise again; killed a fig tree, and refused to answer questions of the religious leaders. Now, He tells a story...
- (3) A man had two sons, and he gives both work assignments
  - (a) One says no, but later regrets his attitude, changes his mind, and does obey his father.

- (b) The other says yes initially, but ultimately ignores the work his father required.
- (c) Which will please the father? The first son who eventually came around did what the father asked, or the second son who just gave his father lip service—looked like he'd obey—but did not!. The first, of course.
- (d) You see, you religious leaders are actually like the second son. You only say you will obey your father, but you really won't.
- (e) And the sinners you see all around you (the ones actually acknowledging I am the Messiah) have a better chance of understanding the Kingdom of God than you ever will! Not so gentle!
- (f) Your religious hypocrisy is why you rejected John the Baptist, and yet all the common sinners believed him.
- (g) And even afterwards, when it was so obvious he was legit, you still would not relent and believe.

## D. The Parable of the Wicked Vinedressers

- (1) Yes, I'm talking to you!
  - (a) But when they saw the son...
- (2) This parable is about a vineyard owner whose operation produces both grapes and wine. It was set up with a

- watchtower which could be used during harvest season to look out over the harvesters (for their protection).
- (a) The owner leased the setup to some tenant operators and went far away.
- (b) When it was time to gather his portion, he sent his servants to collect and they, beat one, killed one, and stoned another.
- (c) He sends even more servants a second time and the same happens.
- (d) Then he sends his own son. Surely they will respect his son.
- (e) But the tenants reason that if they kill the son, they can keep his inheritance for themselves, so they do.
- (f) What do you think the father will do, go away quietly?

  No! He will wipe out those wicked men and he will find new tenants who will act and respond the way they should.
- (g) Then Y'shua uses the Scriptures to connect the dots—He compares these wicked operators who rejected the son with the religious leaders listening to the parable!
  - Please recall all the details about the Chief
     Cornerstone in section one above. We will add some

- additional details below about the consequences for rejecting the Y'shua as the Chief Cornerstone.
- 2. It's like when Nathan decided to tell David a story and the story was all about David himself. You know that technique—your sitting there listening and feeling—"I think this about me!" Yes, this is about you!
- 3. See the Parable in II Samuel 12:1-4, and vv. 4-13 for David's reaction, and vv. 14-25 for the consequences.
- (h) Nathan's story to David has a similar tone as Y'shua's story to the Religious leaders. (Excerpt from our intro.)

- pretended to be humans in the past; but they lied with the intent that those they lied to believed them.
- 3. What type of world do we live in when the monsters who pretend to be human know that everyone knows they are lying, and yet they still lie with a conviction and insistence supported by an robot-like disregard.
- 4. Your roaring MUST BE like a roaring lion!
  - a) You MUST lay hold of your prey!
  - b) No one... will save FROM YOU the one...!
    - 1. who calls evil good, and good evil...
    - 2. who is wise in his own eyes...
    - 3. who justifies the wicked for a bribe
    - 4. who takes away justice from the righteous man!
  - c) In that day YOU WILL roar against them like the roaring of the sea.
  - d) Get ready to ROAR!

#### **QUESTIONS & DISCUSSION**

1. There are three defining moments in Y'shua's life in which He is presented to the world as Messiah!

A. Use the following passages to describe each. ({1} John 1:29 Matthew 3:17; 4:17 {2} Matthew 21:9-11 {3} Matthew 26:39; 26:50-53)

# 2. Y'shua makes His Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem in Matthew 21:1-11...

- A. The people cried out words from Zechariah 9:9. Your task is to read Zechariah 9:6-17 and to describe all that the people had recognized.
- B. Explain using Zechariah 9:6-17 why people could have assumed the Messiah would come as a Reigning King.
- 3. In their prophetic declaration as Y'shua rides into Jerusalem, the people also say, "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!"
  - A. They pull that phrase from Psalms 118:26 and if we explore further in Psalms 118:22-26 we realize how prophetic this moment is. What important thing can you draw from the Psalm that indicates what is about to happen?
  - B. How does Y'shua affirm this later in Matthew 21:42?
- 4. Traditionally Christians believe that Y'shua entered Jerusalem in the final week of His life on a Sunday. And we know He was about to be sacrificed as the Passover Lamb.
  - A. Note: I am well aware that most Christians believe that He entered on Sunday, was crucified on Friday and was raised

- on Sunday Morning. But humor me and do the following exercise.
- B. Use the following scriptures to prove that He entered Jerusalem on a Sunday, was crucified on a Wednesday evening, and resurrected on a Saturday evening. (See: Exodus 12:3-6; Matthew 12:39-40; \*Leviticus 23:9-11; I Corinthians 15:20; Mark 15:25-37)
- C. Food for Thought: \*The Feast of Firstfruits (resurrection) is the first day that follows the first Sabbath that follows Passover.
  On what day must Passover fall for Matthew 12:39-40 to be fulfilled?
- 5. The foundation of the Church is comprised of three foundation stones, one being the Chief Cornerstone—Christ, and the other two being the apostle and prophet.
  - A. Put that statement in perspective using the following passages. (See: Ephesians 2:19-22; I Corinthians 3:16-17; 6:19-20; I Peter 2:4-8; Isaiah 8:11-16; Matthew 21:42-44)
- 6. In Matthew 21:12-17, Y'shua flips the tables and chairs of the merchants and bankers who are taking advantage of the people, while conducting commerce around the temple. Then the blind and the lame came to Him in the temple and were healed?
  - B. What was the people's reaction?

- C. What was the reaction of the religious leaders?
- D. How might cleansing the Temple be associated with the the Passover that was just three days away? (See: Genesis 4:7; Exodus 12:15, 31, 34; Luke 12:1; Matthew 16:6, 11-12; I John 3:4-6, 9; Romans 6:12-15; Galatians 5:9; Hebrews 12:1)
- 7. The people Praised Y'shua for the healing, and when He was rebuked for accepting the praise He said this from Psalms 8:2, "Out of the mouth of babes and nursing infants You have perfected praise."
  - A. However, if you explore the original source in Psalms 8:1-9, Y'shua is proclaiming something much, much more profound! What is that?
- 8. Turning the Tables means to reverse position relative to someone or something else, especially by turning a position of disadvantage into one of advantage.
  - A. Describe all the ways David turned the tables in I Samuel 17:31-51.
  - B. How did Phinehas turn the tables in Numbers 25:7-13?
- 9. What classic Rabbinic technique did Y'shua use when His authority was questioned in Matthew 21:23-27?
  - A. What two options did the religious leaders have and why was each a bad choice for them?

B. What specifically would they have been agreeing to about Y'shua, had they chosen option one?

# 10. At the end of the chapter, Y'shua tells two stories, Matthew 21:28-32 and 21:33-46...

- A. Y'shua has certainly been emboldened knowing it was the last days of His life. What specific accusations does He make in the first story that was cutting to the core?
- B. What is remarkably prophetic about the second story?
- 11. Y'shua used these parables to tell a story with the intention that those listening would see themselves as the characters.
  - A. Towards the end of the chapter, how do we know those listening have heard the message?
- 12. The prophet Nathan used a story to show king David to himself in II Samuel 12:1-4.
  - A. Describe how he did that.
  - B. How did David react and what were the consequences? (See II Samuel 12:4-25)
  - C. What will be the consequences for those to whom Y'shua is speaking in Matthew 21:33-46?
- 13. Use Isaiah 5:20-30 to craft a narrative that relates Matthew 21 to the modern day and then describe your assignment and responsibilities.
